Covenant Corner: Removing Construction Signs

Section 10 RESTRICTIONS, part (f), page states: No advertising sign, political sign, or casual labor signs shall be permitted on any lot or given land area in River's End except during time of construc-

All signs must be removed within ten (10) days after completion of construction. A sign offering the premises for rent, or sale, or both may be displayed upon the lot or given land area, which is for sale or rent, but the sign may be no larger than 24" x 24".

Disposing of our Halloween Pumpkins

According to DNREC, if your pumpkins have not been painted or bleached, you may consider feeding it to the wildlife, like deer, by tossing it in your backyard or in the woods.
